Help or hindrance for end-to-end research, innovation and the Open Science Cloud?

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- Telecoms dominated by monopolistic protected encumberents
- Telecommunications market was highly regulated
- 1980's significant modernisation of the market started
- Internet in Europe starts to take off
- R&E community move from STAR networks to fully meshed clouds
- Some national regulators acknowledge that NREN community is a **CLOSED USER GROUP**
- There was hence a motivation to protect this position by defining:
 - Connection Policy
 - Acceptable Use Policy

Connection Policies more important that AUP

- Connection Policies must reflect local needs
- The scope of Research and Education is changing
 - Globalisation
 - Distributed Virtual Teams
 - Open Data, Citizen Science, Sensor Networks, Internet of Things
- Connection Policies need to be adapted to the changing environment



Acceptable Use Policy









- The network may not be used by a User Organisation or its Members for any activity that may reasonably be regarded as unlawful or potentially so.
- This includes, but is not limited to, any of the following activities:
 - Creation or transmission, or causing the transmission, of any offensive, obscene or indecent images data or other material, or any data capable of being resolved into obscene or indecent images or material; material with the intent to cause annoyance, inconvenience or needless anxiety; material with the intent to defraud; defamatory material; material such that this infringes the copyright of another person; unsolicited bulk or marketing material to users of networked facilities or services, save where that material is embedded within, or is otherwise part of, a service to which the user or their User Organisation has chosen to subscribe; Deliberate unauthorised access to networked facilities or services;
 - Deliberate or reckless activities having, with reasonable likelihood, any of the following characteristics: wasting staff effort or resources, including time on end systems on another User Organisation's network, and the effort of staff involved in the support of those systems; corrupting or destroying other users' data; violating the privacy of other users; disrupting the work of other users; denying service to other users (for example, by overloading of access links or switching equipment, of network services, or of services or end systems on another User Organisation's network); continuing to use an item of software or hardware after the Network Operations Centre or its authorised representative has requested that use cease because it is causing disruption to the correct functioning of the network; other misuse of the network, such as the introduction of "viruses" or other harmful software via the network to resources on the network, or on another User Organisation's network.



- A User Organisation and its Members may use the network for the purpose of communicating with other User Organisations and their Members, and with organisations, individuals and services attached to networks which are reachable via the network.
- The network may be used by a User Organisation and its Members for any lawful activity in furtherance of the missions of the User Organisation.
- Use by the User Organisation and its Members may be in pursuance of activities for commercial gain as well as for not for profit activities
